This document is Hennock Parish Council's response to the 'Teignbridge Local Plan 2020-2040 (Part 3) Review'.


As a Parish Council we have considered the small residential site:

### 4.0 Proposed Site: Community Comments



During our consultation information event we invited our residents to put down their comments on to post-it notes and stick to the appropriate board. Please see photo above that contains 52 post it notes.

Please note that we have mapped the comments into the 'Areas' on which Teignbridge's questionnaire asked. This is for Teignbridge's ease. The raw data (i.e. the exact comments on the post-it notes) can be seen in Appendix B.

## 5.0 Analysis of comments regarding Field off Knights Mead, Chudleigh Knighton

There were 52 comments on post-it notes in total for this proposed site, these have been categorised as below. Please note many post it notes contained comments on several areas.

We had a substantial input from within the Parish to this consultation.

In isolation, the majority of comments/feedback received consider that this development will have a negative impact on the Parish. We did receive verbal feedback that was more positive in relation to this proposed development, when considering the other options for the village of Chudleigh Knighton.

There was some concern about the listed building setting of 'Teign Lawn' and the further potential impact from this proposed development.

The majority of the concerns were in regards to highways and also the environmental impacts. Most significantly the flood plain, the SSSI, loss of wildlife and pollution.

If this development was to come forward, we would like to see the below in addition to the site requirement as set out by Teignbridge.

- Safe walkways and cycle routes into the village
- Pedestrian crossing/safe access for children to the school/ existing play area
- Increased social and affordable housing,
- An alternative access or better visibility of existing access as children play in the cul-de-sac
- We would like to define the local public open space and children's play-area on site, we would like space rather than play equipment
- Appropriate ecology surveys for protection of the SSSI and suitable buffer to development (hedge/Tree etc)
- Increased amount of on-plot parking and electric vehicle charging points to reduce on road parking and future proof the development
- Potential for more allotments

In addition, an Exeter bound A38 junction at the lower end of the village would help to alleviate to pressure of traffic coming through an already stressed 'rat-run' village. This development shouldn't be considered to go into the local plan unless safe highways improvements i.e. a new junction is to be introduced.

#### 6.0 Overall Conclusion and Hennock Parish Council Response

When this site is reviewed in conjunction with the Part 2 consultation which considered four sites in Chudleigh Knighton, our opinion shifts to a more supporting standpoint than stated above.

The previous consultation (Part 2) which considered three sites in Chudleigh Knighton (Land to the rear of Apple Tree Close, Tollgate Farm and Southwest Chudleigh Knighton) concluded that of the two proposed housing sites, we saw Tollgate Farm as the preferred option over Apple Tree Close.

However, of the three proposed housing developments i.e. now including *Field off Knights Mead* also, this one would be the preferred option for any housing development in Chudleigh Knighton.

This development *Field off Knights Mead* is deemed to be safer for our children and an area that has already been 'earmarked' for further development (outside the floodplain).

Therefore, in conclusion, if this development was in lieu of the other two, we would be supportive of this small housing development.



The Draft Local Plan (Part 3) sets out options for where different types of development could be located. The information included within the plan shows all of the development options that are available for public comment, including:

- potential sites for wind turbines,
- a potential gypsy and traveller site in
- Ashburton
- potential small residential sites

There is one potential small residential site within Chudleigh \_\_\_\_\_\_ Knighton (see map to the left).

Site size of 2.7 hectares of which 1 hectare is developable. The remainder sits within Flood Zone 3.
